### Update on 2011 Benefits Plans by Al Horan

It's hard to believe but it's that time of year when we must each decide what type of health insurance we wish to be covered by for 2011. Open Enrollment for Chevron's Medical and Dental Plans will take place between Oct. 18-29. And Open Enrollment material and a Chevron newsletter will be mailed to you in mid-October. (Because of a vendor paper shortage the newsletter will be mailed a few days after the Open Enrollment material.) The Plan changes for 2011 follow below:

**Company Contribution:** Will increase by 4 percent.

#### Medicare Retirees:

Retirees' Contributions: For the Chevron Medicare Plus Plan (CMPP), the Chevron Medicare Standing Plan (CMSP) and the Chevron Senior Care Plan (CSCP), the cost will increase by approximately 0.4 percent, decrease by about 7 percent and decrease by about 3 percent, respectively. For HMO Medical Plans, where applicable, their cost changes will vary by plan. For the Chevron Dental Plan the cost will increase by approximately 7 percent and for the Dental HMO Plans, where applicable, the cost will increase an average between 0 percent and 10.6 percent, depending on the plan.

Plan Coverage and Eligibility: For the CMPP, CMSP and CSCP, the maximum lifetime benefit will become unlimited from \$5 million per person; the deductibles and out-of-pocket maximums will remain unchanged; the copayments will generally remain the same; drug coverage will generally remain the same; vision coverage will be provided through VSP Vision Care (replaces EyeMed); and eligible dependents may be covered up to age 26. HMO Medical Plan changes, if any, will vary by plan. The Chevron Dental and Dental HMO coverages will remain the same.

#### Non-Medicare Retirees:

Retirees' Contributions: For United Healthcare Plans (UHC) Options 1, 2 and 3, on average, they will increase between 24 percent and 32 percent. For HMO Medical Plans, where applicable, the cost changes will vary by plan. For the Chevron Dental Plan the cost will increase approximately 7 percent, and for the HMO Medical Plans, where applicable, on average the cost will increase between 0 percent and 10.6, depending on the plan.

Plan Coverage and Eligibility: For UHC Options 1, 2 and 3 the maximum lifetime benefit will become

# President's Letter

## CRA continues to champion its members economic well-being.

---

It's hard to believe summer is over and the football season is in full swing. I hope everyone had an enjoyable summer and were able to spend quality time with relatives and friends.

We are truly fortunate in having so many outstanding members willing to give of their time to serve the CRA. I am grateful for their support and thank them for joining me in this new fiscal year. Along with the Chairpersons and Subcommittee members who have agreed to continue serving, Dennis Dauphin and Chris Lardge have agreed to chair the Communications and Planning and Research committees, respectively. I also want to thank the outgoing Chairpersons, Kathy Dougherty and Vic Revenko, for their work in the respective aforementioned positions.

We enter this fiscal year unsure of what the future holds for us. Despite all the economic uncertainties swirling around, we continue to champion the cause to advance the welfare of our members.

For example, the CRA Board unanimously approved a resolution to petition the Company to grant pension supplements to our less fortunate members. A letter with in-depth explanations supporting this cause, accompanied with Al Horan's very detailed information, was presented to the Corporation for its consideration. After evaluating our petition, however, we were informed Chevron does not anticipate granting pension supplements in the United States this year.

### **Company contribution increase**

On the plus side, Chevron is planning to increase the Company contribution for Medicare plans by the full 4% in 2011, even though the claims experience warrants an increase closer to the 2% level.

On Oct. 5 we will meet with Chevron Management to discuss Corporate Benefits, Communications and Public Affairs. Claudia Polidori and her staff have been working hard to address the requirements of the new Healthcare Plan. We have been advised the enrollment period is Oct. 18 through 29. During that time you will have an opportunity to change your healthcare coverage for 2011.

### **Evaluate options carefully**

Please evaluate your options carefully. Although there will be many plans on the open market, they may not serve your needs. Insurance is something we all hope we never have to use. But if the need for it arises, we are thankful to have it. No better example this year was when one of our members was confronted with a \$317,000 gross medical bill. Because of his Company insurance, his out of pocket costs amounted to less than \$2,500.

The support we continue to receive from Chevron is greatly appreciated. DebMcNaughton and her staff, along with Dennis Dauphin's guidance, have agreed to assist us in converting our website to a computer language that makes it easier to manage. With Chevron's assistance, we hope to complete the project this year.

### **Join retirees' email roster**

## Canada trio worked as Olympic volunteers

Serving as volunteers last February at the incomparable 2010 Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games in Vancouver and Whistler Mountain Resort in British Columbia were three members of the Chevron Canada Chapter. They are **Kim Fisher** plus **Terry and Mary Levis**.

Following many hours of training, Terry's role was as an Olympic Family Driver assistant before and during the Olympic Games. His prime celebrity "client" was Michael Chambers, president of the Canadian Olympic Committee.

Terry says, "As might be expected, Mr. Chambers was very busy during the Games and had to be everywhere - and it was my job to get him to those places. He had a close relationship with all Canadian athletes and coaches. For me, it was a once in a lifetime experience."

His second interesting client was Sylvania Mestre, who chaired the Paralympics Alpine Skiing Federation. He says, "She faced many challenges, with weather the biggest one. That was another exceptional experience."

Concluding a 30-year Company career, Terry retired from Chevron Canada in 2005 as a tanker truck driver for the Burnaby Terminal near Vancouver. His driving territory was the lower British Columbia mainland where he hauled double trailers carrying about 12,000 gallons of gasoline. His reward for driving tanker trucks all those years without an accident was membership in the Million-Mile Club.

Terry's wife, Mary, served as an Olympics and Paralympics volunteer at the Vancouver 2010 Athletes Village and the Wheelchairs curling event.

Kim Fisher's pre-Olympic adventure began last Oct. 31 when she carried "the flaming Olympics torch 50 meters" (165 feet) in the community of Duncan on Vancouver Island. That exciting experience was followed by serving as a Support Volunteer for the Opening and Closing ceremonies in Vancouver. Her assignment was focused on working in the wardrobe department where 1,000 costumes were stored for the entertainers.

Her involvement for the Opening Ceremony involved many rehearsals and three full dress rehearsals. She says, "All the staff and volunteers came from all across Canada, the States and as far away as Australia. We all had such a great time that I wish the Olympics was coming back next year.

"Following the Closing Ceremony, after a few days of rest, I joined the alpine workforce at Whistler for the Paralympics Games. I was stationed in the athlete's lounge with six wonderful mature ladies. Our job was to assist the athletes in every way. Our work taught us a lot about people with disabilities. It was both a humbling and inspiring experience to see how committed they are."

Fisher was Canadian Area vice president in 2004-05, 2007-08 and 2008-09. She is the CRA's first woman to serve non-consecutive terms as area vp. She also was the Chevron Canada Chapter's first woman president where she served four terms. She retired in 1998 as a stock analyst for the Company's fuel storage tanks at Vancouver International Airport to culminate a 26-year Chevron Canada career.

## Retirees praised for Chevron Humankind support

---

Chevron retirees are playing an important role in Chevron Humankind - the Company's successful community involvement program. During 2008-09, the first years of the program, U.S.-based Chevron retirees contributed over \$9.5 million to their favorite causes.

"Chevron retirees are generous, committed and caring," says Lucretia Weiner, Chevron Humankind program manager. "Because of their participation in Chevron Humankind, colleges receive more funding to improve opportunities, the hungry have food and research moves forward to eradicate diseases."

With Chevron Humankind, retirees and employees choose their favorite nonprofit causes to support. For retirees, the program provides Company matching funds for financial contributions and grants for volunteer time. During 2008-09, employee and retiree contributions, combined with Company volunteer grants and matching funds, exceeded \$48 million to help U.S.-based nonprofits. More than 17,000 participants supported over 10,000 nonprofits.

Through its Give and Match, Grants for Good and volunteer programs, Chevron Humankind supports the Company's commitment to advance the work of nonprofits. Weiner says, "Our retirees' contributions of time, talent and funding allow nonprofits to do important work that improves our communities."

### Participating in Chevron Humankind

Retirees can request matching funds and volunteer grants up to \$2,000 annually for causes they choose. There are two ways to participate:

- **Give and Match:** Give at least \$25 directly to a nonprofit and request a match through Chevron Humankind.
- **Grants for Good:** Help at a nonprofit by logging at least 20 hours of verifiable volunteer time and request a \$500 grant. It's possible to obtain two \$500 grants each year for either the same nonprofit or two different nonprofits. A grant request must be submitted before Dec. 31 in the year you accrued eligible volunteer hours.

"Retiree's favorite causes will benefit by participating in Chevron Humankind's matching and volunteer grant programs," says Weiner. "For example, if you volunteer at your local food pantry, serve as a board member of a nonprofit or sponsor someone in a charitable walk, you can request a match or volunteer grant. Participating in Chevron Humankind gives nonprofits resources needed to change lives."

In addition to the nonprofits helped through community involvement programs, studies have shown that volunteers benefit too.

A Reader's Digest article noted, "What we may not realize is that, apart from satisfying some sense of obligation, helping others can actually improve our mental and physical well health. A Vanderbilt University and University of Michigan study of 3,617 women and men found that those who reported participating in some sort of volunteer work were happier, less likely to be depressed and had better physical health than those who didn't. Next time you're feeling down, consider volunteering a little time to a community service project in your area. It could be just the thing to lift your spirits."

### Retiree and nonprofit eligibility

Retirees are eligible to participate in Chevron Humankind if they retired and met eligibility requirements for retiree medical coverage from Chevron Corporation, a Chevron Corporation acquired company or a Chevron affiliated company. However, spouses and surviving spouses of retirees and retirees of non-wholly owned subsidiaries of Chevron are not eligible to participate. While all nonprofit causes are eligible, organizations must state they abide by Chevron

## CRA paid membership declines

For the first time in three fiscal years the CRA has experienced a substantial decrease in paid membership. The total for 2009-10 was 14,347.

CRA Treasurer Merle Hufford reported, "Our paid membership was down 1,968 from the previous year. Only one geographic area achieved an increase in members and that was the South Atlantic Seaboard.

"I don't know why but the largest decreases by Area were Canada, 24 percent; Unaffiliated, 19 percent; Intermountain, 18 percent; The Plains, 17 percent; and Northern California/Hawaii, 16 percent." Conversely, in the 2008-09 fiscal year, ten of the 12 geographic areas, including Unaffiliated, increased their membership numbers over the prior year.

On a positive note, Hufford was pleased to report that he received dues from all active chapters by June 30.

Hufford also reported that the ten largest paid

member chapters now are Unaffiliated, Contra Costa, East Bay, Metropolitan Houston, North Central Texas, Singing River, Puget Sound, South Bay, Gulf Research Center and Tulsa SGT. Dropping out of the top ten from the previous year were San Francisco, Texaco Retirees Houston and Canadian Prairie.

By the way, here's an important reminder about a major contribution that's a vital key in support of the Association's annual operating costs. A sum of \$3 from every paid annual chapter membership (\$5 from Unaffiliated members) is passed on to the national CRA. Additionally, Chevron Corporation makes a yearly contribution to the Association that is equivalent to \$7 per paid member.

For the CRA's current 2010-11 fiscal operating budget, the membership total of 14,347 translates to a welcome and much appreciated Chevron Corporation contribution of \$100,429 payable to the Association next April.

## Two new committee chairs

President Ernie Breau has announced two changes in Standing Committee Chairs for the 2010-11 fiscal year. **Dennis Dauphin** has succeeded Kathy Dougherty as Communications Chair and **Chris Lardge** has replaced Vic Revenko as Planning and Research Chair.

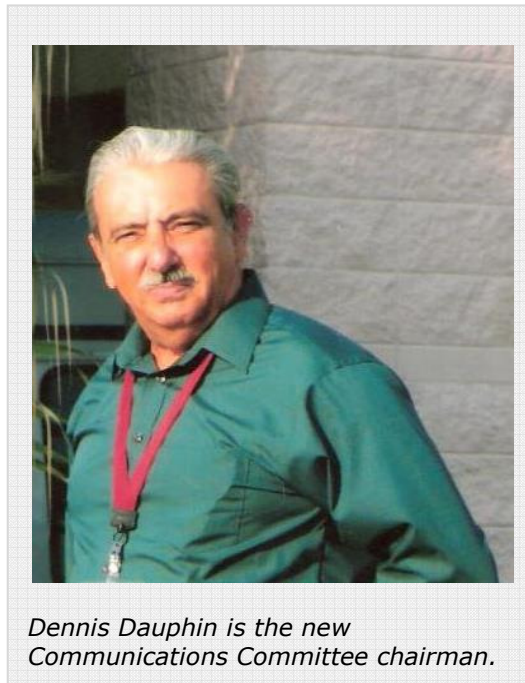

## Wine Country Chapter President Takes Handicap In Stride



At the CRA Annual Meeting in New Orleans the attendees had the opportunity and pleasure to meet and become acquainted with two first-time participants from the Wine Country Chapter in Northern California. They are an unusual - and very special team.

Chapter President **Rich Irwin** is blind and his constant, trusted companion is Tamar, a five-year-old black female Labrador. That is Irwin's second guide dog. To attend the New Orleans meeting, they traveled together from Santa Rosa, California, with an airplane change in Dallas.

Prior to losing his sight, due to detached retinas and several failed surgeries, Irwin was employed 30 years by Chevron. He says, "I had many varied and interesting assignments at Chevron Research Company, Chevron Corporation Product Engineering Department, Chevron Chemicals Oronite Division and Chevron Lubricants Division of Chevron U.S.A. before finishing my career at Chevron Research & Technology Company."

One Chevron job was as the Information Technology coordinator for Chevron Global Lubricants, with responsibility for computerizing formulation and data management at seven USA lubricant blend plants. He retired from Chevron in 1998.

Irwin not only is the Wine Country chapter president but also co-authors its newsletter. He distributes correspondence, such as newsletters, luncheon

announcements and CRA material, including Encore via e-mail and snail mail to his chapter members.

Chapter duties performed at his Santa Rosa home are done with the aid of a desktop computer, a laptop, and a PDA with a Braille display. He uses the new Microsoft Windows "7" program in conjunction with screen reading software. Screen reading software allows his computers and cell phone to audibilize what is on the visual screens.

Additionally, Irwin has found time to serve as an active volunteer with the Lighthouse for the Blind organization in the Marin County city of San Rafael and in San Francisco. At those sites he has provided valuable assistance in teaching legally blind or visually impaired adults 55 and older how to use accessibility tools. His other activities include being Big Sir for Sons In Retirement Branch 53 and Foundation Director for the Valley of the Moon Rotary Club.

unlimited from \$5 million per person; the deductibles, out-of-pocket maximums and coinsurance payments will remain unchanged; the out-of-pocket maximum for mental health and substance abuse will be combined with the UHC maximums; hearing aid coverage for children less than age 19 will be added; vision coverage will be provided through VSP Vision Care (replaces EyeMed); and eligible dependents may be covered up to age 26. HMO enrollees will no longer have a separate mental health/substance abuse benefit through Value Options. These benefits will now be provided solely through your HMO. HMO Medical Plan changes, if any, will vary by plan. Chevron Dental Plan and Dental HMO coverages will remain the same.

If you already are covered by an HMO, Chevron will continue to make available HMO coverage through the same providers as 2010. Other Chevron medical plan coverage will continue to be provided through UHC and Medco. Finally, Chevron non-HMO dental coverage will continue to be provided through United Concordia and vision coverage will be provided through VSP Vision Care.

Please be sure to consult your enrollment material and newsletter for further details about Chevron's plans and please visit Chevron's benefits website at <http://hr2.chevron.com/retiree> or telephone Chevron's Service Center at 1-888-825-5247 with your questions after Oct. 18. You will need your PIN number when accessing the website or contacting the Service Center.

Also, for faster service, you should contact the Service Center outside of peak hours which are all day Monday and between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m., PT, on other days. Lastly, if you do not make any changes during the Open Enrollment, you will automatically be enrolled in the same plan you elected for calendar year 2010. Chevron will mail you a confirmation of your elections for 2011 in November.
