



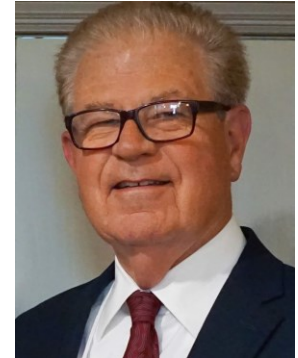

I'm the first Unocal retiree to be elected CRA President and perhaps the first from the Southern California area. Here's a little more background about me:



- Union Oil (Unocal) employee from 1970 to 2004.
- Started in accounting, but moved to employee benefits after two years.
- Benefit Plans Manager, progressing from accounting to administration to planning and development.
- Side job: managed and conducted pre-retirement planning seminars 1984-2004 for employees.

## Chevron Reports Business Results at Annual Stockholders Meeting

May 29, 2019 - Chevron Corporation provided an overview of the company's 2018 operational performance and its future prospects at its 2019 Annual Meeting of Stockholders at its corporate headquarters in San Ramon, California.

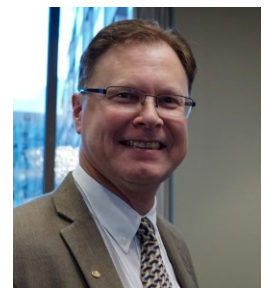
The company earned \$14.8 billion last year, compared with \$9.2 billion in 2017. In the first quarter of this year, Chevron's oil-equivalent production of 3.04 million barrels per day was up almost seven percent from a year ago.

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## CRA Annual Meeting May 19-21, 2019 New Orleans Awards Dinner

**Jim Swartz**, Chevron Gulf of Mexico Business Unit General Manager for Asset Development, was the speaker at the Awards Dinner on Tuesday, May 21.

**Mike Wirth**, Chevron's CEO, was not available for the 2019 Annual Meeting.



A summary of the Dinner Meeting follows:

- The Corp had 0 fatalities in 2018 but suffered one in April this year. Safety continues to be first and foremost in everything the company does.
- Jim praised the Corp's efforts to "Win in any Environment" by continuing to lower operating costs. He said the company continues to have an "advantaged portfolio" with a variety of assets to choose for development. He cited the \$5 Billion stock buyback and the 6% dividend increase in 1Q19 (now \$4.76) as positive indicators of the company's confidence in the future.
- He talked about Chevron's 80-year presence in the Gulf of Mexico and recent new discoveries. Jim stated, "Our projects must make money when oil is in the low 50's. Permian Basin has volume limits. Our projects offer much larger volumes and fewer environmental restrictions. Costs are coming down." He also said that one of their initiatives is "Design one, Build many" an effort to save costs by re-using one offshore facility design for multiple facilities.

Jim then presented the \$5,000 Chevron checks to the 2 very deserving Public Service Award winners (Trudi Dixon and Jim Presten). Their stories and accomplishments follow.

# CRA Public Service Award Winners

## Trudi Dixon: Champion of Small Business

Chevron retiree Trudi Dixon is proud of her expertise in helping small businesses succeed. As a member of the Pascagoula (Miss.) Refinery's Public Affairs department, Trudi helped organize a speakers' bureau, networking events, ribbon-cutting ceremonies and annual awards, all in support of small businesses in Pascagoula and Jackson County, Miss. Her efforts earned her the refinery's 2000 Hall of Fame award for her tireless commitment, dedication and service to the area's business communities.



That year, she retired and quickly became chair of the Small Business Issue Management Group of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce. "When I came into the role, the Chamber's small business group wasn't functioning very well," Trudi said. "That all changed after we developed a wonderful team, which eventually grew from four to 40 members." She continued, "My job at Chevron really helped me to realize that running a successful business starts with networking. The more people the business owners met, the better they did."

Trudi and her team also provided guidance to small business owners about legal and accounting issues ("We had an attorney and a certified public accountant who donated time to advise them"). And they offered training about a range of issues, including how to stay in business. Trudi recalled, "One of the restaurants in town kept losing business because it took them so long to get food out to hungry customers. We helped them speed up the process and offered them other training. But they still went under. It was the one failure we had."

More often, the guidance from Trudi and her team helped make a difference, strengthening businesses, especially in Pascagoula's downtown area. "Along the way, we learned that a lot of business people have to be schooled in customer service. Whatever the customer wants, you have to give it to them. It's the old story of 'Give them the pickle.'" (The principle originated when a restaurant customer was outraged over being charged for requesting a second pickle. An angry letter to the restaurant owner changed the establishment's policy. And "Give them the pickle" became an axiom for providing superior service.)

During Trudi's years with the Chamber, her colleagues dubbed her "The Champion of Small Business" for acting on her belief that small businesses are the backbone of the community and a key to the growth of Jackson County. She said, "It's hard for small businesses to be successful. However, many are doing great in Pascagoula – in most cases, it just takes three to five years to find the right niche."

## Extending Her Reach

Trudi's volunteer activity has extended beyond her work for the Chamber. For example, she has served as chairman of the annual Jackson County Trade Show for eight years and was on the Board of the Industrial Suppliers' Association for 13 years. And she volunteers her time to the Pascagoula Rotary Club's three biggest fundraisers: a golf tournament, a pancake breakfast and an annual drawdown fundraiser. The three fundraisers support teacher grants for Jackson County.

She also served for eight years as finance chair on the Home of Grace Board of Directors. A rehabilitation facility for alcoholics and drug addicts, Home of Grace is a highly respected, non-profit organization.

In addition, Trudi has served as a volunteer for the two major fundraisers of the Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Jackson County. In February 2019, she received a certificate for completing the CASA Advocate Volunteer Training Course to meet all the educational and legal requirements to serve in this capacity. “The organization supplies court-appointed advocates for abused children,” Trudi explained. “I’m currently involved with three children who are in a foster home. And I meet with their foster parents once a month.” She added, “It’s very rewarding for me to work with this organization. Seeing how children are abused breaks your heart.”

Trudi attributed her success as a volunteer to three attributes: organization, leadership, and the ability to facilitate. Her blend of experience, ranging from Purchasing to Public Affairs, has served her well in helping others.

A member of the Singing River Chapter of Chevron Retiree Association, Trudi has received CRA’s 2019 Public Service Award. As her Chapter president wrote in making the nomination, “When it comes to volunteer service, she is known as the ‘Volunteer’s Volunteer’ for her service to her home community of Jackson County, Mississippi. She has participated in almost every facet of making her community a better place to live.”

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## PSA Winner Number 2

### Jim Presten: Paving the Road to Self-Respect

Jim Presten’s Chevron career was devoted to serving motorists’ needs – from his position as manager of Engineering for the Northwest Region to a special assignment in which he worked with then facilities engineer Mike Wirth (now Chairman and CEO of Chevron) to reduce the construction time of area service stations from over 100 days to less than 45 days. This experience led to his second career as head of a consulting firm that designed and developed Chevron service stations throughout the Northwest.



When he retired from the firm in 2007, he sought a volunteer position that would draw upon his skills as a marketing executive. He found the ideal opportunity with the Auto Angels, a non-profit ministry of Bellevue (Wash.) Presbyterian Church that provides safe, reliable cars – and auto maintenance -- to low-income families in the local area.

Through its car donation and repair program, Auto Angels benefits the surrounding community and enables individuals such as military veterans, single parent families, and the elderly to stand on their own without the worry of the high costs of transportation. Jim, in turn, provides the organization with valuable leadership through his automotive knowledge, creative marketing, fund raising strategies, and youth mentorship – paving the road to self-respect for needy individuals. .

Jim first became involved with Auto Angels’ annual car show, which over the years has attracted a wide range of vehicles – “from traditional streetcars to exotic cars, such as a Duisenberg and a \$30 million Ferrari,” said Jim. “After the second car show, which ran a loss, I was asked to run the annual

event,” Jim continued. “And I was able to turn a positive income that could be used to help our clients.”

The key to the show’s success has been the growth in the number of sponsors, who include Chevron Corp. and Chevron Global Lubricants. Registration fees for parking vehicle owners make up the other major portion of the show’s income. Jim and his fellow volunteers have added to the event’s appeal by creating a family-oriented event with many activities for children, such as “make and take,” a program that enables participants to build models which they can then keep.

Jim’s next assignment with the Auto Angels was to develop and implement a program to improve the efficiency in its shop. “I spearheaded most of the improvements to the garage, which originally consisted of 22 parking stalls for staff members at the church,” said Jim. Under his leadership, the space was converted to a functioning garage with eight working mechanics’ bays. Each bay now has newly installed lighting, electrical outlets, compressed air, a complete set of tools, and computer terminals throughout the shop. “A lot of the material has been donated, and we scrounged for the rest,” said Jim.

Every Saturday, the garage is a hive of activity as needy community members have work done on their cars at minimal cost. “We provide a range of services, such as brake jobs, tune ups, radiator changes, and light mechanical work,” said Jim. “We only ask the vehicle owners to pay for parts, because we feel that people need to make an investment in their cars, even small amounts.”

Jim’s next assignment for Auto Angels involved coordination of its donated vehicle program, which has led to the placement of more than 250 safe, reliable cars. “Once the cars are donated, we inspect them, make necessary repairs and turn them over to a group that reviews the applicants and selects the cars’ recipients,” said Jim.

Auto Angels works with a diverse group of organizations that seek to benefit needy individuals. These include Acres of Diamonds, which focuses on helping homeless and abused women; Attain Housing, which serves the needs of families in transition from homelessness; and Congregations for the Homeless, which helps men re-enter the workforce and stand on their own,

Working in conjunction with these organizations, Jim has had many satisfying experiences. “My particular favorite is Katie, a woman who was a registered nurse but who became addicted to painkillers after being in a car accident. Her life spiraled downhill after that. She lost the right to have her son live with her and she lost her nurse’s license. But we helped her bounce back. After she had treatment, she was recommended for a car – and having the vehicle enabled her to get to and from her next job. Three years later, she’s a caseworker at Acres of Diamond and is helping others achieve a better life.”

Another dimension of the Auto Angels mission involves mentoring and inspiring young people throughout the community. In 2013, Jim became a member of the Continuing Technical Education (CTE) program at Bellevue High School. He currently is chairman of the Industry Advisory Committee for CTE’s Auto Tech program, which prepares students to move into the auto maintenance field. In this capacity, Jim mentored a boy who joined the program at just nine years old and is now 17. Together, Jim and the youngest Angel worked to rebuild a gasoline-powered Model T decked out in Texaco colors and logos. Auto Angels now uses this rebuilt “toy car” to teach young people the responsibility of caring for and handling a motorized vehicle, without compromising safety. Jim’s efforts became the foundation for the ensuing program, teaching students basic mechanical skills while satisfying their community service requirements.

Jim is a member of Chevron Retiree Association’s Puget Sound (Wash.) Chapter.

# Benefits Corner

For the benefit topic this quarter I thought that I would take a different path and share with you a human-interest story prepared by my daughter-in-law, Myra Tabios-Dodge, for the MD Anderson Cancer Center located in Houston, TX. Her story has been recently posted on the Center's social media channels in an effort to help inspire hope for other brain tumor patients and caregivers.

Before I share her story with you, I would like to begin with some background information on the subject of family caregiving. According to the Family Caregiver Alliance (FCA), a National Center on Caregiving headquartered in San Francisco, CA, family caregiving is typically at the core of what sustains frail elders and adults with disabilities, yet caregivers often make major sacrifices to help loved ones remain in their homes. The FCA – founded over 40 years ago in 1977 – serves as a public voice for these caregivers, illuminating the daily challenges they face, offering them the assistance they so desperately need and deserve, and championing their cause through education, services, research and advocacy. ## WHO ARE INFORMAL CAREGIVERS?

Most Americans have provided care to an ill or disabled loved one or know someone who has. In fact:

- An estimated 44.4 million Americans provide care for adult family members and friends who, because of disabling illnesses or conditions, have limited ability to carry out daily activities such as bathing, managing medications or preparing meals.
- Informal caregivers provide 37.1 billion hours of care each year in the United States.
- 78% of adults receiving long-term care at home rely exclusively on family and friends to provide assistance.
- 70% of people with Alzheimer's disease live at home, where families provide at least 75% of their care.

## WHAT IS THE BURDEN OF CAREGIVING?

Various studies have measured the impact of caregiving on daily life. Researchers have found that:

- Family caregivers face a range of health risks and serious illnesses themselves.
- Family caregivers experience high rates of depression, stress and other mental health problems.
- Elderly spousal caregivers experiencing mental or emotional strain have a 63% higher risk of dying than non-caregivers
- The long-term effects of caregiving on women's economic well-being are profound: One study found that caregiving for a parent substantially increased women's risks of living in poverty and receiving public assistance in later life.
- 67% of family caregivers report conflicts between caregiving and employment, resulting in reduced work hours or unpaid leave.
- Informal caregivers personally lose about **\$659,139** over a lifetime: \$25,494 in Social Security benefits; \$67,202 in pension benefits; and \$566,443 in lost wages

- Family caregivers spend an average of **\$5,531** a year on caregiving expenses, including household goods, food, transportation, medical co-payments, prescription drugs, and medical equipment and supplies.

According to the FCA, while economic constraints are very real, providing support for family caregivers through publicly-funded programs isn't just the right thing to do, it is sound fiscal policy.

### **Helping my husband through brain tumor surgery,** BY MYRA TABIOS-DODGE

My husband, Richard, likes to say, "If it's not broke, don't fix it!" That's what he said to me when I first noticed the small bump on the right side of his head while we were dating.

I'm a physical therapist and have dealt with patients with musculoskeletal, orthopedic and neurological issues, so I knew to ask him about headaches and vision changes. But he didn't have any other symptoms at that time.

### **Brain tumor symptoms increase**

I noticed some little changes around Christmas 2016. The bump had grown bigger, he had some weakness on his left side, his smile had changed and he started to get headaches with dizziness. By then, we were engaged and busy preparing for our wedding. We got married on March 11, 2017, in Magnolia, Texas. Richard had short-term memory loss at that point and can barely remember the events of our wedding. But he knew he married me!

Richard saw his primary care physician the week after our wedding and was immediately referred to a neurologist. By then, Richard had started vomiting and had terrible headaches.

I was at work when Richard called and told me the neurologist had confirmed what I'd already begun to fear: Richard had a brain tumor. I cried in my car and prayed, "We just got married and have so many plans together; please don't take him away from me now."

### **Brain tumor surgery at MD Anderson**

Richard's neurologist recommended we go to MD Anderson and see Dr. Sherise Ferguson, a neurosurgeon in the Brain and Spine Center. Soon after, Dr. Ferguson performed a craniotomy to remove Richard's tumor, which turned out to be a baseball-sized grade II meningioma, a benign brain tumor.

Because it all happened so quickly after our wedding, we didn't get to go on our honeymoon. We stayed five days in the ICU and teased the nurses that we were having our honeymoon at MD Anderson.

We snuggled in the hospital bed together, took a trip up to the MD Anderson observation deck to see the city and just appreciated that his surgery was successful.



## **Our belated honeymoon**

In September 2017, we were able to finally go on our honeymoon in Hawaii. Before our trip, we asked Dr. Ferguson's advanced practice provider, Ufuoma Avbovbo, what Richard could and couldn't do after surgery. She told us, "Live your life like this surgery never happened."

So we did. We snorkeled, parasailed and even swam with sharks. We had a blast!

## **A brain tumor strengthened our marriage**

After Richard's meningioma surgery, most of his symptoms improved remarkably. Since it was a benign tumor, he didn't have to go through any further treatment. He still has issues with short-term memory loss and sometimes loses his patience. Being a physical therapist, I had the advantage of being exposed to brain tumor patients before, but it's different when it's your own husband.

Richard is a fighter – that's why I fell in love with him. He survived childhood leukemia and still hasn't given up. He may fall and stumble, but will always stand tall.

Although I can't understand exactly what he's going through, I'll always be here to ease his burden and help him. I'm his wife and his motivator. If we've survived a brain tumor and all the physical, emotional, social and financial consequences, then there's nothing we can't surpass, as long as we do it together.
